 - State Advisory Committee
 - Line Depts
- District level- Collector
 - DDMA (Collector, ZP President co-chairperson)
- Sub -District level

- Management of response in disasters requires large amount of tasks to be carried out
- Activities depend upon the nature and type of disaster
- Lack of resources, lack of coordination & communication among various agencies and absence of role clarity pose serious challenges

For smooth and effective response

- No ad-hoc measures
- Plan response
- **Train stakeholders**
- **Role Clarity**
- Networking and coordination with stakeholders
- Communication is the key

Emergency Management & **Disaster Management ????** Is it the same???? It is important to distinguish between the two

- Emergency Management is all about
 - In an event of an emergency, minimizing and control of mass casualties - it is about saving lives and rendering critical care and ensuring of safety of people.
 - Provision of timely and prompt on-site critical care (the golden life -saving hours)
 - Ready and timely access to emergency services required in first few hours.
 - Safeguarding against secondary and tertiary consequences of primary emergency.

Therefore Emergency Risk Management

- Appropriate Capacity Building of different stakeholders (in terms of awareness, knowledge building and acquisition of skills) Strengthen Interagency Coordination Communication Strengthen Contingency Planning at different levels
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- Plan, prepare and rehearse to face any emergency

Strengthening Community Risk Resilience through strengthening the response capabilities of emergency responders -The Core – It is collective responsibility

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- The Delhi Emergency Management Exercise while focusing into health sector preparedness for response, also attempts to address issues coordination, pertaining to interagency interoperability communication and with respect to emergency response.

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OUTCOME 3 : Review of the existing emergency response plans of all the ESFs

- Review of the existing plans at the district levels
- Review of the existing plans at the state headquarter level (with a special focus on interagency command, communication, coordination and control)
- Recommendations made for improvising the current set of plans and procedures with respect to the ESFs concerned.
- Emergency resource inventory mapped with respect to the concerned ESFs of Delhi region.

OUTCOME 9: Testing and rehearsing procedures on interagency communication, coordination and interoperability with respect to emergency/disaster response

- Required facilities to be strengthened by provision of emergency communication equipment (concerned ESFs)
- workshop on interagency communication, coordination and streamlining of protocols on incident response
- Training on coordination of response, communication, planning, efficient restoration of essential services(access/roads, water, electricity)with senior government representatives
- Table -top exercise during action phase provides opportunity to better understand each ESF's plans, resources and response activities. Helps to clarify the roles and responsibilities of each group.
